MAJOR ACTIVITIES:

The OSHA Discipline Committee reviews all Incident Reports involving aggressive penalties distributed to the Discipline Committee by Oregon Referee-in-Chief, ErikNyberg. These reports include guidance from the RIC for any incidents that fall under USAH Rule 411 (see below) for progressive suspensions.

In the past year, the OSHA Discipline Committee has conducted By-Law 10 process reviews for:

- (3) Match Penalties involving Abuse of Officials (one incident involved counsel representing USAH member)
- Match Penalty decision involving Abuse of Officials was appealed to the affiliate under representation by legal counsel; the appeal decision was advanced to USAH National Office.
- Match Penalty involving failure to re-start play/removing team from ice after game started
- The OSHA Discipline Committee has also reviewed By-Law 10 decisions issued through local
 association jurisdiction at Winterhawks Skating Center and Sherwood Ice Arena and determined no
 further disciplinary action to be required.
- Note: All Match Penalty decisions in the Oregon Affiliate must be submitted and are subject to review by the OSHA Affiliate President and Discipline Committee for review, and per the by-laws.

USAH Rule 411:

USAH Rule 411: The role of the Official is to enforce all playing rules at all times and they are expected to strictly enforce playing rules that fall under the aggressive infraction category. Players and coaches must be held accountable for dangerous actions and the onus is on them to teach and play the game within the rules. Officials are required to submit a game report immediately following the game for any major penalty falling in the aggressive infraction category, game misconduct or match penalty that is assessed.

Aggressive Infraction Reporting

Currently, associations are responsible for enforcement/ensuring game suspensions are served/cleared, and there is no central reporting system to the state Affiliate to indicate when a game suspension(s) is served.

In the case of Match Penalties, the association with original jurisdiction for match penalties related to playing rules infractions may conduct a By-Law 10 process to adjudicate the Match Penalty. OSHA By-Laws require the local association decision to be submitted to the Affiliate President and OSHA Disciplinary Board.

However, in the case of Match Penalties related to Abuse of Officials, an immediate suspension occurs if a match penalty is assessed under Rule 601(g)1 or 601(j)1, with a playing rule hearing under Bylaw 10.D) conducted by the state affiliate Discipline Committee. **Member Associations do not conduct Bylaw 10** hearings for Abuse of Officials match penalties.

Page 1 OSHA Discipline Committee Report to Board of Directors |1/24/16

RECOMMENDATION:

The OSHA Discipline Committee strongly recommends that the Oregon Affiliate adopt a tracking system (similar to those employed in many other USAH affiliates) that makes it possible to track repeat offenders of aggressive penalties so that all associations have visibility to these infractions.

Many state affiliates report suspensions on the affiliate website, and have a structured process for clearing the suspensions. This information is available to all associations at all times, and includes players of all ages/levels, and is designed to ensure the integrity of the game and safety by identifying repeat offenders

SUGGESTED ACTION:

Discipline Chair Jill Boeschenstein has researched USAH affiliates' systems for suspensions tracking and would like to propose implementation of a web-tracking system (similar to the Michigan affiliate) in as expedient manner as possible.

Game suspensions reported to the OSHA Discipline Committee would be entered into the suspensions list, and associations will have responsibility for submitting documentation showing suspensions served in order to have players removed from the state suspended players list.

A detailed system adoption document will be provided to the incoming Discipline Chair.

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS AND/OR SUGGESTIONS:

Because of the size of our Affiliate, many volunteers are involved in multiple roles. The importance of ensuring "reasonably disinterested persons" (as required by USAH By-Law 10) is essential to ensure the integrity of disciplinary proceedings.

In addition to the Standing Committee, I would make a motion that the Discipline Chair be granted authority to select Committee Members for hearings in which a perceived conflict of interest may be possible - this may include selecting ad-hoc Hearing Committee designees from other associations, the Pacific District or other USAH organizations for situations where current or past relationships between Committee Members and suspended member may represent a real or perceived conflict of interest.

As a reminder any member over 18 that has regular and routine access to minors needs to be trained (18 year olds playing in Midget U18 and / or High School hockey do not need this training unless they are also coaching at a younger level or a referee). This includes local program and affiliate board members. - We did not reach our goal by the November 30, 2015 deadline. All members should now have completed needed training. One member still not showing in portal, but they have told me they completed the training.

Training - The refresher material / training is now available. Those of you who initially trained in 2013 - 14 did the refresher this past fall. If you trained in 2014 - 15, you will need to do this refresher over the summer of 2016 or fall of 2016. Information is on the USAH site. http://www.usahockey.com/safesporttraining

Rosters - All USAH rosters will now show whether Coaches and Managers are SafeSport verified. This means that member has completed the training or refresher training. It might be possible with a unified USAH screening vendor to have those results show on the rosters as well.

SafeSport Incidents for the 2015 - 16 season - We have had 5 incidents raised to the affiliate level. All but 1 are now closed.

At our last Annual meeting in Eugene, April 2015, the election results for the Vice President and Treasurer Positions were nullified, with the changes that had been made to our bylaws, there was confusion regarding if probationary organizations had the ability to vote in the election process. By the time that determination was made, ballots were sent out, but those members did not have an equal amount of time to return their ballots. It was decided those results would be nullified and a new election would take place. Warrior Discipline

Welcome to the USA Hockey Disabled Section Warrior Discipline. This section is dedicated to injured and disabled US Military Veterans who have served our country and play the sport of hockey.

Eligibility

Must be or have been Veterans and Members of the Armed Forces (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard), with former Members who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

- (a) Undesirable, bad conduct and any other type of discharge other than honorable may or may not disqualify the individual.
- (b) Approved exceptions to be determined by USA Hockey Disabled Section.

Must also meet one of the following criterions for eligibility:

- Purple Heart.
- (2) VA rating of 10% or greater.
- Medically discharged from active, reserves or National Guard.
- (4) Veterans with disabilities that are the result of a disease or injury incurred or aggravated during active military service.
- (5) Post-service disabilities that are considered related or secondary to disabilities occurring in service and for disabilities presumed to be related to circumstances of military service, even though they may arise after service.
- (6) Any Veteran with a disability that did not occur during Military Service and meets discharge eligibility.

Cases presenting multiple discharges of varying character will also be referred for adjudication to USA Hockey Disabled Section.

Rule Change Proposal

100-mile Rule Eligibility Rule for Sled Classic and Sled National Championships

Sled Hockey Classic, Presented by the NHL Current Verbiage

All players from each team must have their primary current residence within a geographical area of a 100 mile radius of their sled team's main practice facility (home rink). Players are eligible to compete with a team if the sled team's main practice facility (home rink) is outside of the 100 mile radius, as long as the player's primary current residence is within the same state as the sled team's main practice facility (home rink).

Players that do not reside within 100 miles of a sled team's main practice facility (home rink) or reside within the same state of a sled team's main practice facility (home rink), may still participate in the Sled Classic, but must do so with the NHL team that is closest to their primary current residence. When determining which NHL team is closest, the address of the actual NHL team's game day stadium will be used. If there is no team participating in the Sled Classic that represents that NHL team, such player would not be eligible to participate.

In the event a player's primary current residence is within a geographical area of a 100 mile radius of their sled team's main practice facility (home rink) and resides within the same state of a different sled team's main practice facility (home rink), the player must play with the team within 100 mile radius of their primary current residence.

The Sled Classic Committee may allow players with extenuating circumstances to play on an alternate team as long as they feel doing so is fair and would still maintain a competitive environment. Teams can and must submit a waiver to request players to be allowed to participate for extenuating circumstances outside the above roster rules.

Sled Hockey National Championships Current Verbiage

The equalization of League play is structured so everyone can play. It will eliminate the all-star teams and force the teams to grow their own program locally. In order to qualify for the National Championship, teams will be held to the standard that their roster (players) will only consist of players whose current primary residence is within a geographical area of a 100-mile radius of their main practice facility (Home rink) and players must reside in the US. Each team is limited to acknowledge one (1) home rink.

If a player whose current primary residence is outside of a geographical area of a 100-mile radius of his or her main practice facility (Home rink), the team must submit a Player Waiver Form on each player outside of this 100-mile radius.

Proposed Rule Change (To be used for Both Events)

You mentioned that USA Hockey would be amenable to considering a proposal from the USA Warriors for rule changes. We understand that any rule changes have to go through a process of consideration and approval by the USA Hockey Disabled Section. To begin that process, our proposed rule change based on our current thinking is presented below. We are open to any ideas and concerns that might improve upon our proposal.

Our proposal is (underlined language is the proposed new rule language):

All players on the team must reside within 100 miles of the team's practice facility (unless player waiver was received and approved). However, this 100-mile rule does not apply and no waiver is needed for a player who lives more than 100 miles of the team's practice facility if the player is a Dedicated Player on a team roster approved for play in one of the three qualifying sled hockey leagues. Dedicated Player means a player who has played at least six (6) games for the team for over two consecutive seasons.

Note that this proposed rule change applies to all disabled athletes, not just those wounded or injured in defense of our Nation. As far as we know, except for high school hockey, sled hockey is the only category of hockey where USA Hockey seeks to impose a geographical limitation on eligibility. In other categories of hockey, many players actually shop for or are recruited by teams and travel long distances or move to play on teams. Sled hockey has grown to such an extent with so many extremely talented players that we feel there is no longer a need for an across the board geographical restriction. Nonetheless, if USA Hockey remains concerned about possible team stacking, our proposed rule makes clear that a player cannot simply teamshop from season to season. The player who moves away from his/her team can continue to play with his/her team if the player has continually played (at 6 games per season) for the team for more than 2 seasons. For example, if a player has learned and been playing sled hockey for several seasons with a team and moves away to college, we do not see any reason why the player should not be allowed to continue to play with the team. The proposed rule covers the situation involving Andrew, Calvin and Christy.

Brief Description of programs and initiatives aimed at growing participation and retention of players: Learn to play hockey program offered through the Bend Park and Recreation District (BPRD) started on January 2, 2016, when the rink first opened. The program has an initial enrollment of approximately 150 youth (age 5-14), in addition to 35 Bend Rapids Club Team Players. There are also an equivalent number of learn to skate participants through BPRD, which is expected to generate increased player participation as the program matures.

Has there been any disciplinary activity with players, coaching staff, or parents? If yes, provide a brief summary and resolution. None.

Is your Member Association planning on hosting any tournaments this season? If so list the dates, and ages/levels:

Each tournament will include only 4 teams due to lack of available ice time. Unfortunately, there is more interest than capacity.

Are there any challenges facing your Member Association right now? If yes provide a brief description with responses and/intervention planned or in the works?

The BPRD Pavilion Rink opened in late December 2015. This is a new facility with new staff and there is on-going operational training required for the facility. This is also the first year that Bend Ice has been a full-fledged member of OSHA, and the USA Hockey Steering Committee and Bend Ice Board are working through the organizational structure and growing pangs associated with all new organizations that rely on volunteer members. This is a work in progress and we may request assistance from other member organizations, on a case-by-case basis. Ice time is also fast becoming a challenge due to the interest with other user groups including curling, adult hockey and figure skating.

Are there any successes you'd like to highlight? The community support for the Pavilion Ice Rink has been beyond all expectations with over 7,500 skaters and 6,000 skate rentals in the first week of operation alone. The inaugural adult house league through BPRD includes 16 teams in 2 divisions and participation was cut-off at 208 skaters and a pool of 12 goalies, with 30 players on a wait-list. The curling league filled-up with 144 participants in the first 2 weeks of enrollment. After one month of operation, BPRD projects that the rink will require little, if any, subsidy to operate through this first ice season (ending on April 1, 2016).

Other comments: There have been many private-sector initiatives to get a full-size rink built in Bend over the past 40+ years. With passage of BPRD's Bond Measure in 2012, the community finally has this recreational asset, and we are very happy to finally be part of Oregon's Hockey Community. There is a very strong ice sport culture already in-place in Bend, and Bend Ice looks forward to hosting other Member Associations and expanding both youth and adult programs in the future. Anticipated 2016-17 season will run from approximately Oct. 15 through March 31

The Rink Exchange Quarterly Report

Recruitment Efforts:

The Rink Exchange has created Intro to Hockey Adult Hockey classes and is using the Try Hockey For Free Youth model, providing free gear rental, ADM style (small area) practices, with free "try a game" efforts for those in class. Each class session is eight (8) weeks in duration. There are three levels (Beginner, Intermediate and Advanced). Current session has 11 players (totally new to hockey) and represents about 5% of our adult hockey population. Over the past year, we've added 14 new players to our program.

We plan to fully role out this model in the Spring with expectations that it will generate approximately 10 new adult hockey players each term. Our goal is to have 30 (exclusive of the current 11) new adult hockey players generated from these classes by the end of April 2017. That would bring our total adult population to approximately 240.

Retention Efforts: The Rink Exchange Hockey League is near 99% retention with natural attrition occurring due to movement of players out of the area (due to school or work). Generally, these numbers are replaced by incoming new players resulting in a small net growth of the league, especially at the B (Intermediate) and C (Novice) levels.

The Rink now offers ADM style practices, Hockey Academy, for players of all levels for those already in league. These classes have lead to more successful play and therefore an increase in retention, especially at the C level. It has also resulted in significantly faster improvement rates among C and B players which in turn has lead to upward movement. That also has contributed to retention.

The Rink also runs rink sponsored All-Star events at the end of the Fall/Winter and Spring seasons. This includes a reception, presentation of awards and trophies, and a general social atmosphere to help foster the development of the adult community. This has generally been well accepted.

Disciplinary Issues:

The RHL has recently had a couple of players who have engaged in fighting and dangerous behavior. Those players received additional supplemental discipline by the league for those actions. Those actions have been, surprisingly, well received by the players in question and we expect this type of play to subside to more normal levels.

Tournament:

Third Annual Eugene Celebration Tournament is scheduled for August. More information to come in the next few weeks.

Referee Reporting:

The RHL has had some issues with the online reporting system for Misconducts. We're working with the USA Hockey National Office to address issues with the Registration Portal and its connection to the USA Hockey National Officials Reporting system.

Winterhawks Skating Center Report Board Meeting - January 24, 2016

The Winterhawks Skating Center currently has 450 adult league players. We are conducting weekly clinics / scrimmages for beginner, intermediate and advanced adult players to accommodate the growing demand for adult hockey.

We're having an excellent hockey season hosting the Jr. Winterhawks at our facility. The culture and atmosphere in our rink is amazing. We're in the process of designing some exciting new programs in the Spring / Summer for current and future Jr. Winterhawks.

Josh Sweeney and Luke McDermott continue to train weekly at the Winterhawks Skating Center. It's an absolute pleasure having them in our building.

The Winterhawks Skating Center has over 560 kids enrolled in our weekly Learn to Skate Program. We estimate nearly 30% of these students are interested in playing ice hockey.

<u>ADDENDUM 1: President's Responses to Action Items from 9-12-15 Regular Meeting</u>

On Saturday I was asked to gather some information and report back to the board. Since some of this is fairly time sensitive, I wanted to make sure you all had this in hand as soon as possible. Here are the items I was asked about:

- 1. Age to officiate an adult game in order to officiate in the adult league you must be over 18.
- 2. Registration numbers from USA Hockey $\,$ these numbers are the final numbers for the 2014/2015 season:
- - Must have 3 teams out of 4 National Bound team 14u, 15, 16u, 18u
 - Should have 8U, 10U, 12U teams as well
 - No more than 10% of registered players in the affiliate can be Tier I. (Less is preferred)
 - No more than 3 5 players from out of the affiliate on any given year roster. (Less is preferred)
 - Should have 10 12 on ice practices per month min.
 - Should have 4 off ice practices per month min.
 - Publish/Advertise open tryout to begin after completion of USA Hockey Nationals.

As stated in the meeting - this is strictly under discussion at the moment. Discussion will continue at the Winter Meeting.

4. Sanctioning for Jamborees - USA Hockey Annual Guidebook page 136 states the following:

VIII. GAMES, EXHIBITION GAMES, INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENTS, SANCTIONED LEAGUES AND SANCTIONED EVENTS

C. Definition of a Tournament: Ice hockey competition, other than normally scheduled league or exhibition games, where three (3) or more legally -registered teams compete within a specified time frame for the purpose of declaring a champion. This shall include gatherings consisting of more than three (3) teams, except Association Exchanges (limited to two [2] Associations), even though there are no winners declared.

Therefore, in the scenario brought up on Saturday if Portland has 2 teams and Eugene has 1 team that wish to play a weekend of games, a sanction will not be required. However, if you add one or more teams from other associations then a sanctioning will be required.

Also note that all games and scrimmages at the 8U age level shall be played either cross-ice or half-ice.

5. ARTICLE 11: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

ITEM A: President: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board and the Affiliate. The President shall make an annual report on the activities of the Affiliate to the membership at the annual meeting. The President shall represent the Affiliate at all meetings (or shall appoint someone to serve in his/her place) at affiliated or unaffiliated hockey organizations at all levels. The President shall be empowered to do all things necessary to accomplish the orderly operation of this Affiliate between meetings of the Board, subject to approval at the next meeting of the Board. The President or his/her designee shall attend all meetings of the Pacific District of USA Hockey and the Annual Congress of USA Hockey.

I believe this covers all the requested items, however, if I have missed something, please let me know and I'll get it completed and report back at earliest opportunity. Thank you.
