I am currently working with a group of officials and Scott Zaban (Va. RIC) out of Arlington, Va. on development of their officiating mechanics and standards for the 10U half ice programs Brad Surdam had spoken to Jason Vallencourt @ National meeting and he put them in touch with me

I have given them some key points that OHOA has found and now use for officiating this new and growing format for the 10U players.

There are many different aspects for officials working these games, and the mentors who are helping to develop the young officials.

There is no current USA Hockey written manual for the half ice format. We are using the basic officiating manual and tweaking it, so as to maintain basic mechanics and standards that will help bridge the gap from half ice to full ice.

Board Meeting - April 13, 2019

Recap for 2018 - 2019 Season -

To educate and support coaches throughout Oregon.

CEP Training – For 18-19 Season; We held classes in Medford, Eugene, Bend and Portland. The Portland clinic was again a very large event held at the VMC, with over 100 coaches attending the CEP or Goalie track for the day. We did have some challenges with coaches wishing to move between the two for the day.

For next year I have some thoughts on continuing education for coaches that do not require USAH classes. We have examples throughout our affiliate where coaches have not been required to attend classes and yet still can benefit from learning the new methods for training.

I would also like to have a OSHA Coaching Summit to get at a minimum all of the local association coaching directors to meet up for both a social gathering, but also to discuss needs amongst the associations and affiliate.

- To have all coaches compliant with their requirements before deadlines

  This is imperative for our affiliate and programs to be successful. Scheduling of CEP and
  other educational opportunities will be coordinated as much as possible.
- To assist our GDC with our affiliate GDC program
  We were able to host one Bronze level goalie class this past season. We will look at a new format to offer GDC classes as part of CEP summits.
- To build on our CEP program, holding HP, Goalie Coach and Youth Coaches education This past season I was able to host a series of classes using self-developed materials and held classes using the traditional USAH CEP slide decks. I believe the new materials were a good fit for Oregon Coaches and will look to expand on that for 2019-20.
  - To hold a competitive development camp to select the top players from Oregon to move on to District and Regional Camps

Development camp was held in Eugene this year. Number of attendees was again a record number of players attending the camp. We were able to offer ice for girls and ice for goalies as well as the youth players. We also offered off ice with Jordan James as well as several informative seminars for attendees.

#### New for 2019 - 20

- Add classroom and on ice sessions based on age appropriate training, gear them towards the age group and not the CEP levels.
- OSHA Coaches Summit
- OSHA Tiering Guidelines for future season.

OSHA Disabled Hockey Report -

Board Meeting - April 13, 2019

Goals for the 2019-20 season have been adjusted with some benchmarks extended beyond the upcoming season.

- Bring all respective hockey associations up to speed on USA Hockey disabled hockey policy regarding accessibility/promotion of all respective branches
- Determine what accommodations statewide rinks/associations do and does not have in regard to providing an equal playing field for all.
- Apply for Grants/funding to expand disabled hockey within hockey associations in the state for 2020 season and the future.
- Discuss a directive of having a budget allocation for every hockey association in the state so
  each association has a set cost allocated for accommodations laid in their annual budget every
  year.
- With the directive set; there is no scrambling for additional funding if there are accommodations needed for a player when the request is made by said player's family/USAH policy dictates it.
- Annual budget set for accommodations/disabled hockey events within each hockey association needs to be a new regulation added to the OSHA bylaws as well regardless if an association needs it or not annually.
- This directive needs to be discussed and implemented as part of the agenda for July's board meeting with all associations present at the meeting.



- Determine the quota of players/interested parties for each program viability/visibility in the long run, each association will need to gather that information within their community and bring it to my attention by July.
- Coordinate with USA Hockey HQ/Pacific District Region Disabled hockey branch regarding having PJW and LAHA host a clinic/try hockey for free day event for various branches for disabled hockey at some point in early 2020 or 2021.
- Deaf Hockey: Washington State school for the Deaf/Blind (Portland Jr Winterhawks) and
  Oregon State school for the Deaf/Blind in nearby Salem (LAHA) will need to collaborate on
  two dates that works the best for all parties involved. On ice staff training for accommodations
  would need to be arranged prior to dates selected in order to maximize the experience for kids
  involved. Grant funding will also be discussed/PR needed to promote said event.
- Sled hockey: Coordinate with Josh Sweeney/Rico Roman/Wendy/Lester/Kellie on expanding the program in the state/establishing a registry network of all sled players in the state and what are the necessary steps that have to be in place to make it a reality. Lester/I will schedule a meeting TBD with above parties to discuss all details.
- Special Hockey initiative will be determined after establishing which host association statewide has the numbers of interested parties in order to launch a program/grow it.
- Promote disabled hockey related events to all associates via website.
- My long term goal at this point is to have Oregon be able to field a youth/adult team in one or multiple branches of disabled hockey and have the teams participate in the disabled festival/ other events within 3-4 years from the establishment of the program. It has to be a true collective effort not just from the association that hosts the program but also from the community surrounding that association to ensure longevity/stability of the program.
- Blind Hockey: Position needs to be created, I have reached out to key personnel within the Chicago Blind/Minnesota Blind hockey program on what needs to be done to establish key groundwork for the launch of the program or programs within OSHA.

# OSHA SafeSport Report April 13, 2019 OSHA Meeting

- 2018/19 Objective- To have all OSHA Associations SafeSport compliant by <u>November 30, 2018</u>. ACCOMPLISHED! Oregon was compliant this year again. Two years in a row. Great job everyone.
- > Two SafeSport cases have been reported to USAH National HQ so far this season (Since October) from Oregon. One of them was an allegation of sexual abuse and has been reported to the U.S. Center for SafeSport. It is pending.
- Congressional action prompts changes to SafeSport- Because of the congressional action last year that strengthened the U.S. Olympic Committee's hand regarding sexual abuse of amateur athletes, the SafeSport Handbook requires updates. Many other updates will have to be done as well. Highlights include:
  - SafeSport Handbook to be updated in the next 45-90 days
  - Background screenings and company we use for screenings will change for the 2020/21 season
  - SafeSport trainings will become annual each season starting this coming season
  - Rink facility employees will all have to be trained and screened
  - More updates will be shared when I attend the Annual Congress in June 2019
- been working with a small group of Legal Council Members and SafeSport Coordinators to make revisions to the USA Hockey SafeSport Program Handbook in order to incorporate changes required by federal law, the USOC and the US Center for SafeSport. Those changes will be shared with all SafeSport Coordinators soon.
- Goal for 2019/20 season will be to continue to focus on locker room monitoring and how to improve processes across the state.

Brief Description of programs and initiatives aimed at growing participation and retention of players: The 2 main programs we have in Eugene for growing participation and developing adult players for the REHL are the Adult Intro to Hockey and Adult Hockey Academy. The Intro to Hockey Program is for beginners and focuses on the 5 main skills of hockey (skating, stickhandling, shooting, passing, and body contact) the same way a beginner youth hockey program does. The main purpose of this program is to prepare a new player for playing in the REHL C League. The Adult Hockey Academy is more for people who already play in C League and want to hone their skills so they can move up to REHL B League. The main focus is still the 5 main skills of hockey but also begins to teach some more advanced skills.

There are several ways the RHL works to retain players. The first is to draft teams every season to try to make the teams as equal as possible. This creates a more competitive league and prevents players from dropping out because they are on the worst team season after season. In addition to the draft, there is a mid-season calibration where league officials and the captains sit down and evaluate how the teams are doing. If one team is too strong or too weak, trades will be made to try to even the teams out. Because of this system, players often form friendships with many of the players on other teams which results in a sense of community among the players and creates a friendly but still competitive environment. The last thing we do to retain players is to identify players that behave in reckless or dangerous manners. These players are warned and if they don't change these behaviors they are banned from the league.

- 2. Has there been any disciplinary activity with players, coaching staff, or parents? If yes, provide a brief summary and resolution. Yes, we have had 2 match penalties during the 2018-2019 season. These players received the required review for their penalty and have either served or are serving their suspension. In addition to the match penalties, we have had several game misconducts this season. In all cases, the player served their additional game suspension required by USA Hockey.
