Reports: Officers

President Report: Lester Sparks

District meeting -

Michigan had a few full ice labor requests

Referee assignment issues on the east coast still exists. District registrations up approx. 11.5%. Most from Nevada and that is exploding. We are the smallest affiliate in the district ow. We are 2-3% up from previous year but still struggling. Girls held summit this past weekend but we did not have anyone attend. IGF event went off in Seattle. Team USA went 3-0 against Canada. Women's leadership program promoting girl's hockey. Youth development, camps will be the same as the previous year including allocations. Goalie – have camp again in August at the Kraken facility. Will be adding a coaching development side to this. Added new GEC from Alaska name Chris Kamara. Settled on the tournaments this year. 16u are for tier 2 nationals and

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14u and 18u for tier 2 national, 19u tier 2 girls for districts for districts Feb 23-26. May 4th – 7th for the girls, May 11th – 14th for boys district camps. We will have 49 teams. Numbers are rebounding on the west coast in the bigger states. Referee situations continues to be a problem but getting better. Western regionals is June 12th – 17th.

Those who applied for the Bob Leaf Freeman grants were approved. K Falls and RVFA got the grants approved. District putting together a letter to the Hall of Fame for Scotty Gomez. He is of Latin descent, 1000 games and points. Next meeting Feb 4th in Las Vegas.

President's meeting – facilitated by the national office.

- Presidents typically meet twice a year and don't interact much more than that.
- DEI purposes and to bring all together
- Creating a Kaizen environments, team builders, very helpful to bring the group together
- People from USOC, Ted Stevens act.
- Task for working on new rules for tryout dates – find a better plan. Constant churn of players. Affiliates not being aligned on the current rules. Constant churn of players and affiliates not being aligned. Everyone doesn't enforce the rules the same way. Looking to align.
- Enforcing no-tolerance rules
- Officials task force – recruiting and retention.
- Presidents are going to meet once a year in person going forward. Will also have quarterly zoom meetings. Creating connectivity that wasn't there in the past. Will also have quarterly meetings as well. Creating a connectivity that hasn't been there in the past.
- Asked Stephanie Jackson to come out to discuss DEI topics and how they apply to Oregon.

Treasurer's Report: Kara Minchin

 - Budget – We are past due on approving the budget
 - Budget is balanced as it stands. Kara used numbers from a few years ago on some estimates
 - Girls budget in/out is a wash so they don't really count into things
 - The referee budget ask of \$6000 and an additional \$2000. Toby spoke: Additional \$2000 is directly related to the mentoring team. Used to purchase iPads for recording and displaying and recording games. Track suits for mentors on the ice so they can be identified while on the ice. Benchmarked other associations and what they are doing.
 - Last year budget was \$5500. An extra \$500 was for hotel rooms for the seminars in Portland
 - Total \$8000 this year
 - Joy: We once talked about breaking out Team Oregon girl's budget and having it separate. This is on Kara's to do list.
 - We need to balance our budget. Kara reduced the grant match.
 - Q: How do we want to present the budget? Balanced or unbalanced? No One has input about how to balance the budget.
 - \$1500 in for tournament fees
 - Andy: RIC AHOA budget request? Where is the request coming from? AHOA is not a thing in USA hockey. Does not want to give AHOA money but will support Toby's Mentoring program.
 - Carrie – how is the mentor program to be distributed across the associations?
 - Toby – budgeted for 3 iPads. Tech will be travelling rink to rink.
 - Bend 16u, 14u, 19u nationals – Andy will lookup how we funded those last year.
 - \$1500 each last year. We need to add \$4500 to the budget
 - Budget is tight. DEI money will force us to dip into Savings.
 - Q: Do we want to be \$5000 in the red? Kara feels it is better to expense it out in the beginning.

Kara motion to approve the budget the way it is presented with breaking out the line for team Oregon where the tryouts will go and adding \$4500 in the tournament fees line. Seconded. Kara abstained. No opposed, Motion carries

Discipline Committee Report - 11.08.2022

Since the July 2022 OSHA meeting, there have been three match penalties assessed.

The match penalties were:

1. 601(e2) - "Behaving in any manner that is critically detrimental to the conducting of the game, including but not limited to spitting at an opponent, spectator, game or team official, or verbally threatening or intimidating a Game Official, opposing Team Official or opposing player with physical contact or harm." As of 8/28/2022, the player is to be suspended for eighteen (18) months ending 2/28/2024 for violation 601(e2) - Abuse of Officials. This suspension exceeds the suggestion established by the USA Hockey Standardized Discipline Policy for 601(e2), although the committee deemed that given the the player continued threatening the official after the game off the ice, the player did not follow the officials directions off the ice and did not recognize that his actions were threatening to the official, the player's continued confrontational stance in the process of disciplinary hearing, and while the player stated he took responsibility he continued to explain why he was justified in his behavior and when confronted directly by the disciplinary committee began arguing with the disciplinary committee. The disciplinary board concluded that the player did not accept responsibility for the severity of his actions on 7/28/2022.

2. 602(a) - "Attempt to Injure or Recklessly Endanger An Opponent." The player was an adult player and was suspended for seven (7) games total. As of 10/10/2022, the player had served four (4) games, thus he is ruled to serve an additional three (3) games for violation 601(a). This suspension follows the suggestion established by the USA Hockey Standardized Discipline Policy for 601(a). Player was issued a 1 year probationary period to end on 10/31/22.

3. 622(c) - "**For grabbing or holding the facemask.**" The player was an adult player and was ruled to have already served his suspension as of 10/18/2022 by already missing over 30 USAH activities, including 12 adult games. This suspension exceeds the suggestion established by the USA Hockey Standardized Discipline Policy for 622(c).

OSHA Safe Sport Report November 7, 2022 OSHA Meeting

- **2022/23 Season Objective--** To have all OSHA Associations Safe Sport compliant by end of November 2022. All associations in the state reported compliance with Safe Sport training for coaches, managers and locker room monitors by end of November. Continue to focus on locker rooms. Remember, the majority of Safe Sport issues start in locker rooms. Be vigilant.
- **Training-** Now that training is on a 12 month cycle (see below) and Safe Sport training is required annually, please encourage your coaches and managers to get the training over the summer as opposed to waiting until the last minute to do it prior to game starting in the fall. **Remember: All coaches must have training updated prior to hitting the ice in the fall so they should all be complete at this point.**
- **Updates to Safe Sport-** In December 2021, USA Hockey sent an update to all players and parents regarding updates to Safe Sport from the U.S. Center for SafeSport. I am also attaching a letter that was sent to all associations. **Please note the discussions about Dual Relationship Exception Forms.** Here are some of the highlights of the changes from USA Hockey (pay particular attention to the training requirements below):
 - Updates to MAAPP Policies-
 - The Center regulations are set forth in the SafeSport Code for the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Movement (the “SafeSport Code”) and the Minor Athlete Abuse Prevention Policies (the “MAAPP”). The Center revised the MAAPP, which will become effective as of January 1, 2022. Accordingly, USA Hockey has posted an updated USA Hockey Safe Sport Handbook, which includes Center-approved MAAPP prevention and training policies applicable to USA Hockey programs. The new Safe Sport Program Handbook is available online at www.usahockey.com/safesportprogram. USA Hockey’s website contains additional materials and resources regarding its Safe Sport Program. All USA Hockey member programs are required to comply with the USA Hockey Safe Sport Handbook, including implementation of the requirements of the MAAPP.
 - Changes to Training Requirements
 - In addition to the above changes, the Center now requires renewal of SafeSport Training to be completed *within 12 months of the prior training*, as opposed to USA Hockey’s previous policy of requiring training once each membership season. This will become effective for USA Hockey’s new membership season beginning April 1, 2022. Thus, after April 1, 2022, persons who complete training will be required to complete it again within 12 months or they will become ineligible to participate until the training is completed. This will be a continuing requirement each year.
 - How to Report
 - USA Hockey’s Reporting Policy is a vital part of its Safe Sport Program, and an effective reporting policy is crucial to preventing abuse. Section IV of the Safe Sport Handbook contains specifics on the Reporting Policy – for more information on making a report, please also see: www.usahockey.com/makingareport.
 - The Center has exclusive jurisdiction to investigate and resolve allegations of sexual misconduct within USA Hockey programs. The Center also has the discretion to accept jurisdiction over other types of misconduct, but for the most part allegations of other types



of misconduct, including emotional or physical abuse, bullying, hazing, threats or harassment, or violations of the MAAPP, are investigated and resolved by USA Hockey and its regional Affiliates.

- Reports to U.S. Center for SafeSport
 - If an Adult Participant reasonably suspects that an incident(s) of Child Abuse or Sexual Misconduct has occurred, they must immediately report the incident(s) to the Center as well as applicable law enforcement authorities. Reports to the Center may be made by (1) completing an online report to the Center at www.uscenterforsafesport.org/report-a-concern/ or by (2) calling 833-587-7233.
- Reports to USA Hockey
 - Reports of any allegation of misconduct or other inappropriate behavior that may violate Safe Sport Policies other than Sexual Misconduct or Child Abuse, should be made immediately to USA Hockey or the applicable Affiliate Safe Sport Coordinator, or may also be made to the Center. Reports to USA Hockey may be made by: (1) clicking on the "Report to USA Hockey" link on the USA Hockey Safe Sport Program webpage (www.usahockey.com/makingareport), (2) emailing to usahockeysafesport@usahockey.org, or (3) calling 800-888-4656. Goals for the 2022-23 Season:

- Continue to educate and support as many coaches as possible to work with goaltenders in the State of Oregon
 - We educated 30 new coaches at the Pacific District CEP Bronze level Goaltending Clinic last year.
- **USA HOCKEY BRONZE** Goaltending Virtual CEP:
 - There are still two Bronze Goaltending courses available this Fall: One November 19-20, and one December 6-8. Please encourage your coaches to take this course- it will go a long way to help your goaltenders.
 - A new model for SILVER Goalie Coaching training was implemented last year with continued online learning across the season combined with a weekend of on-ice training. It is already underway for this season. The Gold Level CEP clinic is currently being revised.
- Continue to update the Oregon database of Goalie Coaches and Goaltenders in the state to communicate with them and collaborate on all things Goaltending. Also, be able to track the Oregon goaltenders and where they play and where they end up.
 - My database is in its fifth year, it is constantly being updated to include all our goaltenders and track their team play from one year to the next. It needs to be updated to include all "goalie" coaches so we can create an Oregon coaches email group for information sharing

Program Guidelines: This winter, I put together a goaltending guide section to add to our Bend Rapids coaching handbook. I wanted to include a copy here for you to modify/edit or use for your home associations to provide a basic guideline for coaches, if that is something you are interested in.

Bend Rapids Coaching Handbook, Goaltending Section

GOALIE COACHING TIDBITS:

We are lucky to have two regular goalie coaches/GDC's- they are here for a reason and are very knowledgeable about all things goaltending, so please use that to your advantage. If you have any questions, please reach out and ask at any time.

Some Important Fundamentals for ALL Coaches to know.

1) GOALIE GEAR

- Proper fitting gear and proper protection are essential to all goaltenders. If you are unsure on sizing for gear, please ask the GDC's. Injury because of inadequate gear is a surefire way to turn a kid off goaltending.
- Make sure the 8/10U goalies using quick change gear are also wearing a neck guard with their helmet- there should be one in the gear bag that covers the collarbone as well.
- For all goalies, make sure gear is properly sized to protect them and allow mobility, and it provides an adequate level of protection for the level of play (i.e. no regular player helmets at 12U+, and no "street hockey" level or seriously outdated gear)
- They all need knee pads under their goalie leg pads, proper neck protection (either a collarbone neck guard, a dangler on their mask, or both), and proper cup under the gear (both male and female goalies).

2) PRACTICE BASICS**

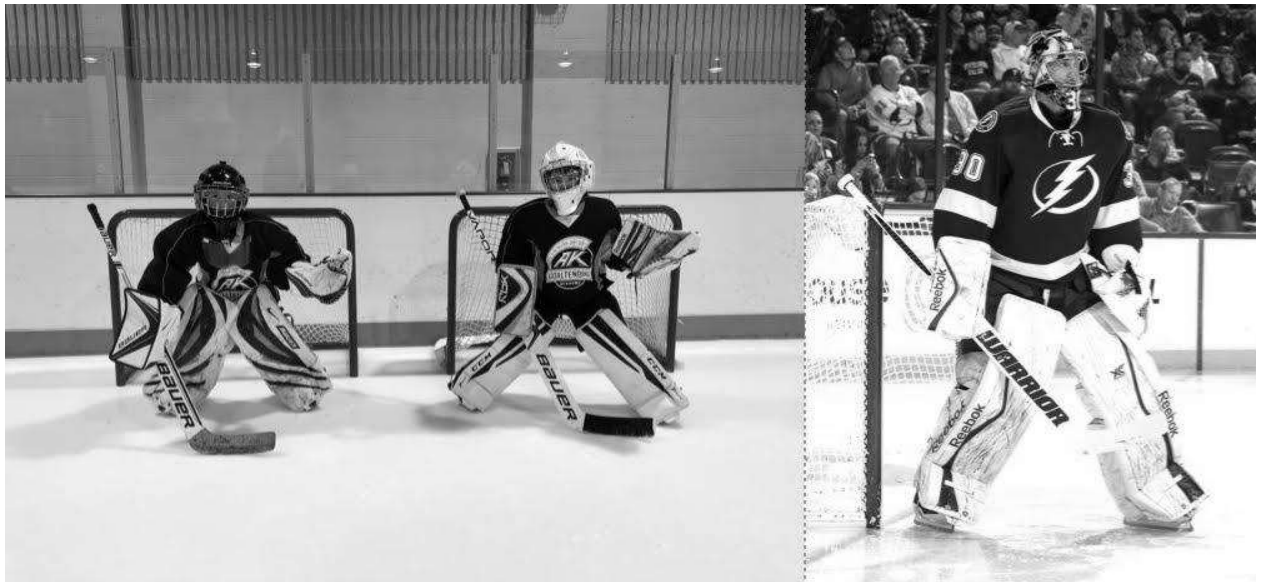
At a minimum, practice for goaltenders needs to include:

- Proper warm up time for the goalies before they are thrown in net to stop pucks- this is essential to prevent injury. All goalies will be trained in how to warm up if there is no goalie-specific coach on the ice for practice, but they need time and space to do it.
- Some goalie-specific drill time to work on specialized skills in a controlled setting.
- Drills MUST be spaced so goalies have time to reset between shots and follow rebounds on the shot- otherwise they will not be in the habit of tracking the puck all the way in and out in game play to control and play rebounds. Players need to be spaced out on drills so goalies are not getting more than one puck coming at them at the same time. This means you might need to slow the speed of players entering into a drill or station. This is crucial to goalie development and the best thing you can do for your goalies at practice. Getting "pummeled with shots" or having more than one puck coming at them is NOT how to prepare a goalie for game play. Quality over quantity.
- Likewise, goalies need breaks in practice too- water breaks, brief stretching breaks, etc. Often the players have "lines" and breaks during drills, but the goalies do not- work them into your practice plan.
- Add a crease to the net when using nets out of the painted crease on the ice. This small detail helps the goalies understand their angles and depth during drills and small area games. All coaches should have a crease marker for this purpose.

- Put the pegs in the nets- at all times. The goalies need them to be able to play the post properly, you are doing them a disservice if you don't peg the net every time.
- When designing your practice plan, when you add a drill or station, take a second to consider "What is the goalie doing in this drill?" "How does this benefit the goalie, and what are they working on here?" "How could I tweak this drill to make it better for the goalies? (ex. could I add a dump in that the goalie stops behind the net to start the drill that adds a puck-handling component for the goalie)?" That will help you consider the perspective of the goaltender in terms of their development, not just as a "target" to shoot at for players.

3) NET SIZE

- We use small nets for 8U. Always.
- We often use small nets for 10U as well- but we occasionally switch back and forth between small and big nets at this age group. There are pros and cons to both, but here is an example of net sizing for comparison.



4) PLAYING GAMES and AGE-SPECIFIC INFO

- In order for goalies to develop, they need to play.
- We encourage all goalies to take risks, and try things even when it might not work perfectly (ex. Coming out and playing the puck behind the net, passing to players, etc)- we would rather them try and make mistakes then not try- please support them
- 8U/10U- we want ALL kids to have the opportunity to try goalie in practice, and games. We also want all goalies to have the opportunity to skate out in games- it will help their development. If multiple goalies are playing in a game, switch half way between each period.
- 12U- Goalies can specialize if they want to. Goalies should play equally. They can switch halfway through each period, or half way through the game and alternate who

starts the game. This keeps them engaged and also age-appropriate for concentration and psychological pressure.

- 14U- Goalies can start playing the entire game and alternate games for play. Both goalies should play on any given weekend- do not have goalies travel to sit on the bench. For select games (like championships), coaches can select their top goalie, but ideally both goalies get the opportunity to play in these 'higher pressure' games.
- 16/18U (Rec Teams)- Both goalies should alternate games unless in tournament/Championship play, and even then ideally both get opportunities to play in the playoff or final games.
- 16U/18U (Rep Teams)- Goalies can earn their playing time, but for development purposes, try and get both goalies game play when it is appropriate. Ideally, you have two goalies that can just rotate game to game. We also want them both getting opportunities to play in tournament play and playoff games to learn how to handle the pressure.

5) GAME WARM UP

- Goalies need a proper warm up for games. They should warm up before stepping on the ice, but on ice, they need time to do a proper goalie warm up still.
- Players should be trained to "warm the goalie up", rather than try and snipe the goalie, take clappers off their head, or miss the net entirely. The warm up is crucial to game readiness, so this should be a discussion between the coaches and the goalie coach, as well as the team.

6) GET YOUR BRONZE GOALIE COACHING CERTIFICATION

- ALL coaches in the program should get their Bronze level goalie CEP completed.
- It gives coaches a baseline of goalie knowledge, allows you to better communicate with your goalies, and provides consistency between you and your team's goalie coach(es).
- It teaches the 6 goalie fundamentals of Stance, Skating, Positioning, Save Selection, Rebound Control, and Recovery.
- It also discusses at length how to provide a better practice plan for your goalies, how to better incorporate goaltenders into your stations and drills, and how to redesign existing drills to improve them for your goalies as well. They will thank you and your team will reap the benefits as well.
- If you have a separate "goalie session" practice every week, have your team coaches attend to learn more about goaltending, to see what their goalies are working on, and learn how to communicate with their tendys. It will also help them incorporate those skills into their practice plans to allow the goalies to work on what they learn in goalie sessions during regular practice time.

Brief Description of programs and initiatives aimed at growing participation and retention of players: The 2 main programs we have in Eugene for growing participation and developing adult players for the REHL are the Adult Intro to Hockey and Adult Hockey Academy. The Intro to Hockey Program is for beginners and focuses on the 5 main skills of hockey (skating, stickhandling, shooting, passing, and body contact) the same way a beginner youth hockey program does. The main purpose of this program is to prepare a new player for playing in the REHL C League. The Adult Hockey Academy is more for people who already play in C League and want to hone their skills so they can move up to REHL B League. The main focus is still the 5 main skills of hockey but also begins to teach some more advanced skills.

There are several ways the RHL works to retain players. The first is to draft teams every season to try to make the teams as equal as possible. This creates a more competitive league and prevents players from dropping out because they are on the worst team season after season. In addition to the draft, there is a mid-season calibration where league officials and the captains sit down and evaluate how the teams are doing. If one team is too strong or too weak, trades will be made to try to even the teams out. Because of this system, players often form friendships with many of the players on other teams which results in a sense of community among the players and creates a friendly but still competitive environment. The last thing we do to retain players is to identify players that behave in reckless or dangerous manners. These players are warned and if they don't change these behaviors they are banned from the league.
